Notetaking and Understanding Main Ideas

Taking notes is a crucial step in developing study skills. Notes help the student understand the material, and they serve as reference material when students are studying for tests. Students with learning disabilities often have difficulty "chunking" or sorting information into units or main ideas. Help your younger child by categorizing and sorting. Older students can learn to write down the chapter and section titles to give them an overview and break down the studying into manageable chunks.

Multisensory Support

Use multisensory, hands-on learning. Many times, you can use items you already have at home. Items that are appropriate for your child's age and abilities to easily manipulate. Multisensory learning means that children can listen (auditory), see (visual), touch (tactile), and/or use movement (kinesthetic), offering several ways to learn.

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Organizing Your Study Space

Make sure your child has a place to study. Select a place that is well-lit and that has little or no distractions. Each child needs all the school supplies necessary in an organized space. At the minimum, we recommend that you have the same items at home that are on the general school supply list. Keep all these supplies in one space, possibly in a homework box to avoid as much distraction as possible.

(e.g., a tote with a flat lid and handles)
